into your car and step astride your motorcycle you are making an act of faith. You believe that the tyres will remain glued to the road, that the brakes will work instantly and perfectly and that all mechanical parts will work with precision and smoothness.

But unless everything has been cared for this

simply isn't going to happen. A car engine is a machine with parts working in unison – but that's all. It doesn't have the human capacity to

recover itself. There is an added problem in that cars of today are so sophisticated that DIY servicing is out of the question. This means you have to bite the bullet and entrust the wellbeing of your car to the experts.

Amateurs simply don't have the knowledge nor the tools required to do the job properly. Inevitably, any car will

deteriorate over the years and while the owner may compensate for shortcomings he or she knows, deep down, that performance is not what it should be. And a poorly-performing vehicle costs more in the long run. Only a perfectly-tuned engine can turn in the fuel consumption figures ratified for a vehicle by the Government.

Regular check-ups ensure that the car is as safe as it can possibly be kept. Remember that many of the inspections that are made can provide an early warning of potential trouble in the future.

You owe it to yourself, your family and anyone you carry in your car along with all other road users to make sure your car is always in its best condition.

So, a final note of caution . . . if you break down on a dark winter's night in the snow miles from anywhere don't kick the car.

Kick yourself for not keeping up with your obligations to it.



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MOTORING NEWS riven to distraction

OVERCROWDED roads car drivers late for work, school appointments on average or nearly five times in a typical term-time month, according to an online *Which* survey. This is despite people already

taking measures to dodge queues. Four out of five drivers plan their journeys to avoid congestion and a similar proportion leave earlier or later than they should to avoid jams. A quarter of drivers regularly avoid journeys completely rather than getting stuck in traffic. It's clear that traffic

congestion is driving people to distraction. Which asked

hundreds of people what they think the solution is and almost half of people surveyed want to see cheaper public transport and 13% want more to be done to encourage people to walk or cycle.

People were even supportive of some fairly drastic restrictions on car use with over two thirds of people favouring a ban of the school run. Parents taking their children to school accounts for about 20% of term time traffic congestion.

A quarter of people want a limit of one car per household; a third want to ban 4x4 cars at peak time, despite the fact that

they don't take up more road space than other cars. A quarter support the idea that people who drive with no passengers at peak times should pay a charge. On some roads congestion is so endemic that the systems are not alerted. And sometimes

there is no reasonable alternative route available. Alternative route available. Malcolm Coles, editor of which.co.uk, said: "It is clear there's no quick fix to the problems of traffic congestion. "People in our survey think botton and choaran public

TENS of thousands of drivers are being hit with major repair bills after putting the wrong fuel in their car, so take care when you are filling up. That is the warning from

the AA Trust who said that misfuelling affects an estimated 120,000 drivers each year. The average repair bill is £150, but can be as much as £3,000.

It is also caused by drivers mistakenly filling their diesel engine cars with petrol. Now the AA Trust and

petrol retailers are launching an information


campaign to tackle the problem.

It is also a problem when people hire cars, and with drivers who use a differentlyfuelled vehicle at work from their own.
